Ballads

Purpose

Ballads are narrative poems, intended to tell a story.

Structure

Ballads can have several verses. Each verse has four lines. Sometimes, verses may be repeated throughout the poem.

Rhythm

Ballads have a song-like rhythm, created by the number of beats it takes to say each line. Usually, the first and third lines in a verse contain four beats, while the second and fourth lines contain three beats.

Rhyming Pattern

Ballads usually follow an abcb rhyming pattern.

Example

Here is an example ballad about a visit to the park.

I went for a walk to the park one day, And what do you think I found? A busy bee stuck up in a tree, And a bee hive down on the ground!

I bravely walked up to that bee hive, And what do you think I did? I poked that hive and it came alive, So I ran away and I hid!
